ABOUT MROZ INSTITUTE: FOUNDING, MISSION & STRATEGIC PARTNERS

The Founding

The John Edwin Mroz Global Leadership Institute (Mroz Institute) is a collaborative partnership between the College of Charleston's School of Languages, Cultures, and World Affairs (LCWA) and the EastWest Institute (EWI). Since 1980, EWI has facilitated candid discourse among world leaders to form sustainable solutions for major political, economic and security issues. After 40 years of work, the EWI transitioned its operations to several strategic partners, chief among them was the College of Charleston. The formation of the Mroz Institute came with a more than \$2 million gift from the EWI Board of Directors and a nearly \$500,000 gift from longtime EWI supporters, the late Marshall and Arlene Bennett through the Bennett Family Foundation.

LCWA has a special connection to EWI, as John Mroz was instrumental in the school's creation at the College of Charleston. One of the key initiators, local entrepreneur Hilton Smith, tapped the expertise of his friend, John Mroz, founder of the New York City-based <u>EastWest Institute</u>.

With the help of Mroz's international vision, LCWA opened its doors in 2006. Now, to preserve the legacy of EWI's visionary leader, who passed away in 2014, Mroz will be honored as the namesake of the new <u>John Edwin Mroz Global Leadership Institute</u> housed within LCWA.



The Mission

The mission of the John Edwin Mroz Global Leadership Institute is to promote essential skills of global fluency, educate students about diplomacy, and prepare them to become future global leaders through a comprehensive strategy of international education and experiential learning. We seek to preserve and continue the values and legacy of EWI and its founder, John Edwin Mroz, a fiercely independent champion of conflict prevention and resolution. Issues surrounding public health, the economy, the environment and sustainability, food security and migration affect everyone, everywhere, and are at the heart of our international security. The Mroz Institute cultivates the skills students need to engage with such challenges and, through an emphasis on mentoring, helps develop students who will become international agents of change and global leaders. The programming, colloquia, and archival projects at the heart of the Mroz Institute's mission ensure every College of Charleston degree is an asset in the international marketplace and every student is a potential leader in a tightly interconnected global world.



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Strategic Partners

The College of Charleston inherited the EWI legacy alongside four prominent foreign policy organizations that adopted existing EWI programs: the Atlantic Council, the George H. W. Bush Foundation for US-China Relations, the Observer Research Foundation America, and the Stimson Center.



EWI's Balkan Dialogues initiative migrated to the Future Europe Initiative at the <u>Atlantic Council</u>, complementing the initiative's existing work on the Western Balkans, which seeks to build further Euro-Atlantic political and economic integration.



EWI's US-China High-Level Political Party Leaders Dialogue is now hosted by the <u>George H. W. Bush Foundation for US-China Relations</u>, which has extensive experience organizing Track 2 diplomatic discussions between current and former government officials from the United States and China.

STIMSSN

EWI's Middle East and North Africa work moved to the <u>Stimson Center</u>, an independent research center promoting international security, shared prosperity, and justice. Stimson has three decades of experience conducting Track 2 and Track 1.5 diplomacy. Its well-recognized work on water and energy issues will be enhanced by the addition of the hydro-diplomacy project. Stimson also took on both the US-China military-to-military dialogue and the US-Russia military-to-military dialogue.



The institute's Global Cooperation in Cyberspace programmatic work encouraging countries in the Global South to participate in international efforts to moderate the use of cyber weapons and research to improve the security of the technology supply chain transitioned to <u>Observer Research Foundation America</u>, the new Washington-based center of India's leading think tank, the Observer Research Foundation.



2023-24 PROGRAMMING

World Affairs Colloquium Series

The Mroz Institute World Affairs Colloquium brings to campus speakers with prominent international experience to address topics of global importance. In Fall 2023 we focused on international and domestic security concerns (General Michael Moseley) and issues of Brazilian identity and Brazil's role in Latin America and international relations (Ambassador Santos).



In Spring 2024 our speakers addressed the issues of Estonian, European, and Euro-Atlantic security challenges (Ambassador Kristjan Prikk) and the role of culture and languages in shaping diplomacy and foreign policy (Dr. Jesús Fernández González). We always invite our speakers for comprehensive visits that include public talks, class visits, and informal small-group discussions with students. The speakers used public talks to engage our students and faculty in substantive discussions about international issues. During small-group discussions, the speakers talked about their career paths, education experiences, professional challenges, and the skills that internationally-minded organizations seek when hiring staff.

"Global Disruptions and National Security Challenges" with General Michael Moseley, the 18th Chief of Staff of the Air Force, September 18, 2023.



General Michael Moseley

General Moseley retired after a distinguished 40-year military career as the 18th Chief of Staff of the US Air Force. He discussed global security challenges and explained that the existing set of accepted norms that have defined the post-Cold War global order is in transition. Russia's aggression against Ukraine threatens the security architecture in Europe. China is viewed as a competitor but also a threat to US economic and national security interests. Iran's nuclear program and North Korea's nuclear and missile programs challenge the stability and security in the Middle East and on the Korean Peninsula. General Moseley argued that US leadership is indispensable for the stability of the global order and for the international community to deal with global challenges. 6



"Identity and International Relations: A View from Brazil" with Ambassador Luís Cláudio Villafañe G. Santos, October 2, 2023.

Luís Cláudio Santos is a diplomat, historian, and biographer. He serves as Consul General of Brazil in Atlanta. As a diplomat, he served at several Brazilian including Mexico **Embassies** City, Washington, Montevideo, and Quito. He was Ambassador of Brazil to Nicaragua from 2017 to 2022. He is the author of several books about Brazil's foreign relations history. During the public talk, Ambassador Santos focused on the unique nature of Brazil's identity and its evolution over time. He discussed Brazil's global ambitions and how its membership in BRICS advances Brazil's interests. According to Ambassador Santos, today's Westerndominated global order is not working given the economic and political power exercised by non-western countries, like India, China, and Brazil.

He was optimistic about the cooperative efforts of the BRICS alliance despite the divergence of interests within BRICS. He highlighted the importance of knowing the history and local context for successful diplomatic efforts of foreign service officers. This public talk was co-sponsored by the Department of Hispanic Studies and Mroz Global Leadership Institute.

"The Future of Europe – should it still matter to America?" with Kristjan Prikk, Ambassador of Estonia to the US, January 24, 2024.



Ambassador Prikk and Dean Arias

Kristjan Prikk is the Estonian Ambassador to the US. He served as the Permanent Secretary of the Estonian Ministry of Defense and Undersecretary for Defense Policy in the Ministry of Defense. Ambassador Prikk's talk focused on the biggest security challenge in Europe since World War 2. He argued that the Russian war was not only about Ukraine also about the broader security architecture of Europe. He shared the belief that the defeat of Ukraine in the war will be Europe's defeat, which will ultimately weaken European security. Russian ultimatums to Ukraine and Western countries have clearly shown that Russia wants to weaken NATO and make it ineffective.

It is critical for the Euro-Atlantic alliance to continue supporting Ukraine to ensure that the Russian military is defeated in Ukraine. We appreciate the Zeitgeist Foundation and its president Klaus Becker for facilitating the Ambassador's visit to the College of Charleston.

"Foreign Policy through language and culture: the power of soft diplomacy" with Dr. Jesús Fernández González, March 14, 2024.

Dr. Fernández González serves as Counselor for Education at the Embassy of Spain in the US. As an educator, he teaches Spanish as a Second Language (SSL) at the Universidad de Salamanca and North American universities. As a researcher, he studies the influence of mother tongues on the process of second language acquisition.

In his talk, Dr. Fernández González explained the impact of globalization on minority languages, discussed the future of languages, and outlined best practices to protect indigenous languages. He viewed the language as a tool of soft power used by diplomats and policymakers. This public talk was co-sponsored by the Department of Hispanic Studies and Mroz Global Leadership Institute.

 David Hickton discussed the international
 efforts to address cyber crimes. He
 highlighted the role of the Chinese
 government and Russian non-state actors
 involved in illegal acts of hacking, stealing
 intellectual property, and committing
 other cyber crimes.
- A new era for US foreign policy, fireside chat with Ambassador James Story, career FSO, who served as US Ambassador to Venezuela, 2018-2023 at the embassy in exile in Bogota. Dr. Aimee Arias, Dean of the School of Languages, Cultures, and World Affairs facilitated the fireside chat Ambassador Story on regional democratic backsliding, the rise of "the rest," migration challenges, domestic problems in Venezuela. Ambassador Story explained because of internal political polarization, the US is no longer viewed as a trusted partner in Latin America.
- The Middle post-conflict East: diplomacy the two-state and solution with Toni Verstandia. Executive Director of the Verstandia Family Foundation, served as Deputy Assistant Secretary of Near Eastern Affairs at the US Department of State. Toni Verstandig tackled a challenging and politicized topic relationships in the Middle East and the important role of international actors required for regional stability.
- Are the US and China destined for war: cold or hot? - fireside chat with Dr. Joseph Nye, Distinguished Professor of Government at Harvard University, US Assistant Secretary Defense, and EWI Board Member. Dr. Max Kovalov, who facilitated the fireside chat, and Dr. Nye discussed the origins of the soft power concept and how it traveled from Dr. Nye's conversations at the kitchen table in the early 1990s to the diplomatic and foreign policy world, the changes in the interdependent and globalized world, and the Chinese and American use of soft power.



- The role of NGOs in conflict resolution with Dr. Jeff Helsing, Executive Director of the Better Evidence Project and Research Associate Professor in the Jimmy and Rosalynn Carter School Peacebuilding and Conflict Resolution. Dr. Helsing focused on an underappreciated role played by non-diplomats in conflict resolution. He discussed local solutions offered non-governmental by organizations that facilitate community and interpersonal relationships needed in post-conflict societies.
- Diplomacy and cooperation without responding trust: to Russia's nuclear threats with Rose Gottemoeller. former Assistant Deputy Secretary of NATO. Currently Research Fellow at Hoover Institute, Stanford. Rose Gottemoeller focused the discussion on the escalation of nuclear threats by Russia, importance of Western support to Ukraine, and the need for negotiations on nuclear non-proliferation without preconditions.

Global Ambassadors Program

Global Ambassadors is a professional development program designed for students interested in careers with international service organizations, including the civil service and Foreign Service. This program creates opportunities for interactions between students and foreign service officers, civil servants, diplomats, and distinguished professionals in internationally oriented organizations working on global challenges.

During the 2023–24 academic year the cohort of seven Global Ambassadors met weekly with the Mroz Institute's director to learn about the Foreign Service and its challenges and opportunities, US national interests, and foreign policy priorities. The students participated in organizing the programming of the Mroz Institute by helping coordinate the visits of guest speakers, introducing the speakers, attending discussions sessions, and interacting closely with distinguished guests. They also worked on practical skills by preparing weekly memos on topics of regional and thematic interests, delivered presentations, and learned about diplomatic work.

Remembering Karen Linehan Mroz

The College of Charleston community is feeling the loss of one of its greatest champions, Karen Linehan Mroz, who passed away Jan. 13, 2024. Mroz made an impact on many lives around the globe and shared her experiences and passions with the College of Charleston community. She worked in both the nonprofit and private sectors in business, education and philanthropy, with a focus on education and women's empowerment in the Middle East.



Mroz, together with her late husband, John Edwin Mroz, played an integral role in the creation and development of the EastWest Institute, an organization dedicated to conflict resolution by facilitating civil candid discourse among world leaders. Thanks to her unique vision and perspective, the College of Charleston was able to work with the EastWest Institute to establish the John Edwin Mroz Global Leadership Institute. Since the institute's launch in 2021, she made it her mission to ensure College of Charleston students have the tools and experiences to be globally curious and grow as leaders.

Mroz assumed positions on the institute's steering committee and the School of Languages, Cultures, and World Affairs' advisory board. She also played an active role in the Mroz Institute's EWI oral history project run by the Addlestone Library. She was not only an interviewee of the oral history project: She was also prepping to be an interviewer and help expand the catalog.

"Karen was committed to continuing the legacy of her husband, John Edwin Mroz, and the EastWest Institute here at the College of Charleston," says Aimee Arias, dean of the School of Languages, Cultures, and World Affairs. "She was passionate about ensuring that students get the skills they need to be engaged global citizens; to be able to address global issues through critical thinking, teamwork, problem solving and a deep understanding of international affairs. Karen was so gracious and generous in sharing her time and knowledge with us, and while we will greatly miss her, we will honor her by continuing to grow and enhance the Mroz Global Leadership Institute and the opportunities it provides students to become truly globally fluent."

One of Mroz's greatest passions was mentoring students, particularly the International Scholars. She would regularly come to campus to meet one-on-one with students. She loved to hear their plans and share her experiences.



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"Karen was interested in the professional development of students, and she invested her time to ensure they had the tools to succeed," says Max Kovalov, an instructor of international studies and the Bennett Director of the Mroz Global Leadership Institute. "She was always open to chatting with students about their interests and career opportunities. Karen's own professional experiences in the education of children and women empowerment made her invested in the development of our students."

"Karen Mroz meant so much to this College community," adds Arias. "She was never more excited than when meeting with students. She really enjoyed hearing about their internships, other co-curricular activities and career aspirations, and she was one of the most requested mentors for our International Scholars."

One such scholar is Sara Solan, an international studies and political science double major.

"Karen saw me not just as a student, but as a potential change-maker in the world," says Solan. "Her warmth and hospitality were refreshing. She insisted on breaking formal barriers, asking me to call her Karen, not Mrs. Mroz because, she said, 'That's my mother-in-law's name.' While Karen is no longer physically with us, I am confident that her bright spirit and passion for helping others will continue to illuminate the path for the Mroz Institute and students at the School of Language, Cultures, and World Affairs here at the College. The mark that she leaves on us here truly shows how extraordinary she was. Karen made us feel valued, capable and important. We will strive to honor her memory by embodying the values that she exemplified."

In addition to serving as a mentor, Mroz frequently recommended speakers to come to campus as part of the Mroz Institute World Affairs Colloquium Series. She was highly involved in the inaugural convening of the Mroz Institute in March 2022 and was playing an instrumental role in the upcoming February Mroz Institute Summit on conflict, cooperation and diplomacy

"Karen Mroz was a transformational partner and philanthropist to the College of Charleston," says Andrew T. Hsu, president of the College of Charleston. "On a personal note, I think we have lost a truly wonderful person – someone whose intelligence, humor and passion represented the best ideals of our campus. She did more than just talk the talk about change and making the world a better place – she walked the walk. Karen will be sorely missed, but her legacy lives on through the Mroz Institute and all the students who take part in the program."

The **Karen Linehan Mroz Global Leaders Scholarship** is being established at the College of Charleston Foundation to recognize Mroz's extraordinary impact on the College and on the generations of future students who will become stronger global leaders because of her tireless work to weave global fluency into the fabric of the College of Charleston experience.
